

FSGA WORKING FOR YOU IN TALLAHASSEE

Once more FSGA will have an active presence in Tallahassee in the coming months and in preparation for the 2027 Legislative Session which is scheduled to commence on March 2nd. Legislators will nonetheless be convening earlier with preliminary meetings right before Thanksgiving and immediately after.

Additionally, FSGA is currently planning its Annual Rally Tally for the week of February 1st. Our annual treks have been invaluable to everyone as besides meeting with policy makers, we spend time talking with agency leaders including those from the Dept. of Elder Affairs. Each Chapter is encouraged to send representatives from your area to join in this important effort.

Of particular note, FSGA this year is proposing certain changes and improvements to Florida law. Chief among them is to once and for all consolidate the annual registration process for guardians in just one agency - that of OPPG, and stop the needless duplication to also register with each County's Clerk of Court. This duplication stems from old laws no longer applicable and wastes time and energy from both the guardian and the Clerk's Office. Far better the Clerks use the valuable time to be timely with the annual accountings for instance.

In the interim, each Chapter is also encouraged to invite your local state legislators to your Chapter meetings. Being engaged in conversations with policy makers is always a good thing.

Everyone's involvement in all these efforts is welcomed and needed.

Get ready we plan to hold out Annal Lobby Day along side the 6th Annual symposium in Tallahassee February 4, 2027.

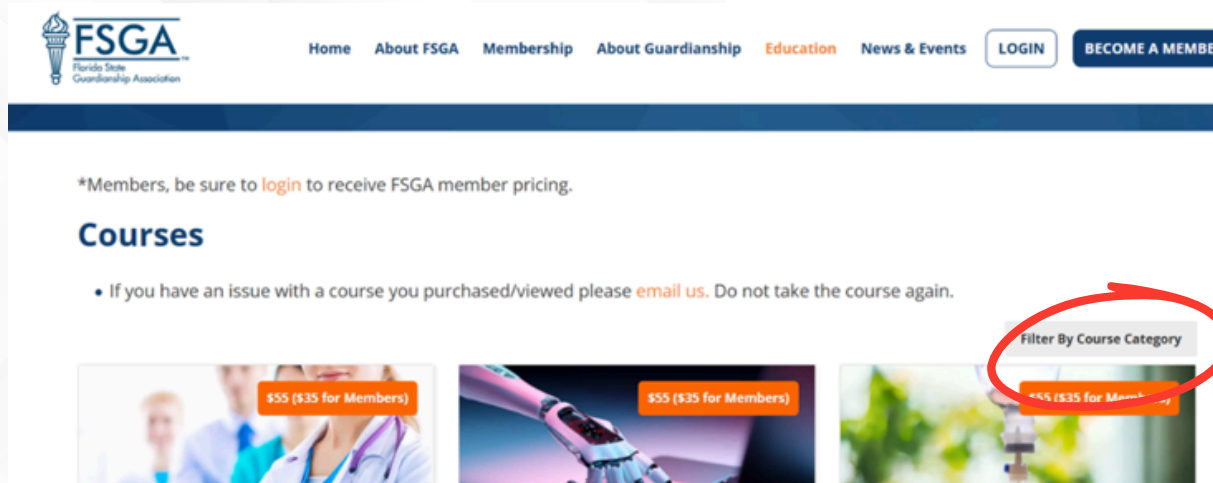

PROTECTING CLIENTS' FINANCES THROUGH FLORIDA'S PUBLIC GUARDIANSHIP POOLED SPECIAL NEEDS TRUST



Foundation for Indigent Guardianship, Inc.

Effective guardianship involves protecting clients' finances while helping them qualify for public benefits such as Medicaid and Supplemental Security Income (SSI). For clients dependent on these benefits, managing assets without jeopardizing eligibility is complex.

The Foundation for Indigent Guardianship, Inc. (FIG), Florida's official support organization for the Statewide Office of Public and Professional Guardians, has a pooled special needs trust to simplify this process. Managed by Advocates & Guardians for the Elderly & Disabled, Inc. (AGED), FIG's trust safeguards clients' assets and provides funding to improve clients' care, dignity and oversight.



Key Benefits of FIG's Pooled Trust

- Expert assistance protecting clients' finances while maintaining benefit eligibility.
- Funding for personal needs like clothing, medical care, dental, transportation, and burial.
- Transparent financial management with online access and quarterly statements.
- Oversight to prevent loss of benefits due to trust distributions.
- Annual independent audits for peace of mind.
- Financial support for public guardianship programs, ensuring a legacy of care for Florida's vulnerable populations.

Mission and Legal Foundation

Created in 2005 under Florida law (Section 744.2105), FIG supports public guardian programs by providing supplemental financial resources that state funding alone cannot cover.

How It Works

Anyone, including public guardians, can use the FIG pooled trust to protect assets and preserve eligibility for public benefits. AGED administers more than 250 pooled trust accounts, helping ensure regulatory compliance and financial security. After a beneficiary dies, most remaining trust funds return to FIG, which redistributes them to local public guardianship programs to support other clients. Public guardians may also apply to FIG for special emergency funding when an Offer for Funding has not been received.

Leadership and Accountability

FIG is governed by a board appointed by Florida's Department of Elder Affairs, maintaining strong oversight, transparency, and alignment with statewide priorities. Annual audits reinforce its commitment to stewardship and service for indigent, incapacitated Floridians.

Getting Started
